When you visit a Chinese transplant ward it is full of people with complications - lots of them and comparatively few new transplants - they manage patients for weeks in hospital when we and US discharge everyone in the first week - 4 days Max in the US, 5 or 6 for us

Dear Prof Chapman,

Would you be able to help me by clarifying a point that you made in your June 2017 statement to the Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade (copy attached).

On page 2 you state that: "To give you some idea of the difference, they would have to have between three and four times the entire US transplant program implemented in China. Because of the difference in the capacity to manage them, you would probably have to multiply that by 10 because of the different practices. Thirty to 40 times the US infrastructure—doctors, surgeons, operating theatres and medications—and not being able to see it is just implausible to us."

Why would the Chinese need 30-40 times the infrastructure that the US requires to do the same number number of transplants?

Many thanks for your help - I am preparing for my own statement to the current inquiry into organ tourism and trafficking on Friday so have been looking through previous appearances to get a feel for the issues covered.
