

Correspondence from Louisa Greve - Director of External Affairs, Uyghur Human Rights Project (UHRP)

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Less than a dozen people (out of millions) have survived, been released from the camps, reached safety abroad, and been willing to tell their story. You can give this information to the Tribunal to enable them to feel confident about their due diligence, in having testimony from 4 Uyghurs already.

UHRP staff are aware of one additional potential witness. who has testified about medical-related matters. However, she does not speak about examinations of marketable organs, but rather about forced injections and forced ingestion of unknown drugs. And of course torture. In other words, this witness is able to testify about a program of systematic and horrific abuse that qualifies as a crime against humanity, but do not appear to have experience that confirms a program of organ-harvesting.

Sayragul Sauytbay, who was forced to serve as a "teacher" in the camps, is now in Kazakhstan. Unfortunately we do not have her contact information. It is possible that Gene Bunin is in communication with her. CNN reports that "a friend among the nursing staff told her about injections and medication given to the Uyghur inmates, although Sauytbay never witnessed it herself. But sometimes after inmates were inexplicably taken out of their cells, they'd come back appearing dazed and more pliable." She witnessed horrific conditions of food and water deprivation, and filthy sanitation, and witnessed young girls being taken away, and then being returned in terrible condition, leading her to suspect rape or other sexual abuse.
